2025 North Dakota Game & Fish Department Special Allocation Big Game Drawing

The North Dakota Century Code provides a special allocation big game license lottery for qualified non-profit organizations which are federal tax exempt under IRS Code 501(c)(3). North Dakota Game & Fish Department manages the application process and conducts the lottery drawing. Successful applicants may be awarded a license to be used as a fundraiser, with a portion of the proceeds used for a conservation or education project. We apply every year for this opportunity but have yet to be selected. We were recently notified that we were unsuccessful in the 2025 lottery.

The number of eligible organizations applying for the sixteen big game special allocation tags continues to increase every year. Currently, eligible organizations must be IRS Code 501(c)(3) non-profit and in good standing the North Dakota Secretary of State. Documentation must be submitted proving such with each application. One hundred and forty-six organizations applied in the 2025 drawing. House Bill 1094 (in the current legislative session) seeks to expand that eligibility to any IRS Code 501(c) organization or entity. If eligibility changes as outlined in the legislation, the flood gates will open and there will be a significant increase in future applications for any one of those sixteen tags.

<u>Using Cable Devices in North Dakota</u> – This seminar includes everything from cable device construction to actual field setting of both restraining and lethal devices, checking sets, ethics and responsibility, and detailed information for targeting different furbearers. Reservations are required so let me know if you are interested.

<u>2024 Education Program Roll-Up</u> – The education program had 16 separate events in 2024, which put our program in front of 448 members of the public. 68 individuals enrolled in our course and were certified. These numbers do not include the estimated 35,000 individuals that pass by and interact with our booth during the North Dakota State Fair. It comes at a cost for our volunteers though, totaling 429 volunteer hours with approximately 3210 miles driven. That is out-of-pocket expenses and time away from family or family events. <u>Volunteer Help for State Fair</u> - We need a volunteer or two to set up our trapping education booth at the state fair and once the fair is over, taking down and storing all the equipment until next year. The set up occurs on Thursday before the fair begins and the take-down is done Sunday morning after the fair closes. It is not difficult; it just requires a few hours on each of those days. <u>Education Program Tanned Pelts for Sale</u> – we currently have some really nice red fox and bobcats at Moyle Tannery. Once they are finished and returned, we'll offer those for anyone interested. The funds generated from these pelt sales go directly to our education program. Stay tuned

<u>Correspondence Course Now Available</u> - We offer a correspondence course for individuals to complete our fur harvester education class for certification. This is another option for individuals who may be unable to attend the full 16-hour course currently offered. Individuals can contact the North Dakota Game & Fish Department Outdoor Education Office (701) 328-6300, NDGFD website, or me to enroll. Participants will be required to satisfactorily complete the chapters of our student manual and attend an 8-hour field day for certification. Field days will include hands-on training with equipment and satisfactorily complete the authentic assessments included in the student manual.

<u>Fourth Edition Education Manual</u> – Work continues with the fourth edition of our education manual. Our timeline suggests that it will be printed and ready for the 2026 education season. Some chapters with notable improvements include lure making, furbearers as food, and cable devices. A dictionary of lure making ingredients is also added as an Appendix to complement the lure making chapter.

<u>Bob Gangl Memorial Awards</u> – We were unable to present these two awards in 2024 as all course graduates were adults.
